She was born 20 October 1789^{12,13}, and died 17 August 1828 in Hardin County, Kentucky (prob.)^{14,15}.

According to the book itself, it records six visions of the prophet Ezekiel, exiled in Babylon, during the 22 years from 593 to 571 BC, although it is the product of a long and complex history and does not necessarily preserve the very words of the prophet.
